Huge fiber ring planned around Tucson to boost Internet service for rural Pima County

On Thursday March 21st, Supervisor Sylvia Lee came to our local Fire Station to talk to residents about what concerns they might have

Supervisor Lee started the meeting by telling us "Pima County and the Feds are investing 43 million to provide broadband fiber lines that internet providers can use to carry high-speed internet to rural areas which includes Three Points."

She then passed out this map of the planned Fiber Ring to boost Internet service.

I felt this information was so important that I went on line and found this article from Tucson.com.

Pima County is set to get a 134-mile line of fiber internet infrastructure to create a ring surrounding the urban core of Tucson that's set to provide high-speed internet access to rural and historically underserved areas.

The Biden administration announced more than \$930 million in high-speed internet infrastructure grants across the country on Friday, of which Pima County is set to receive \$30.3 million over five years from the National Telecommunications Information Administration.


The county plans to construct an open-access fiber ring that it's calling the middle mile infrastructure project to quickly carry large amounts of data over long distances the county said is expected to reach one-third of the county's population.

The county and nearby jurisdictions are required to provide \$12.5 million in supplemental funding for the project, bringing the total investment closer to \$43 million.

One of the significant things about access to broadband is that when that happens, economies, communities flourish," County Administrator Jan Lesher said at a news conference Friday. "We know that the statistics are there and that areas that have higher access to broadband services, they earn more, their wages are higher, there is lower unemployment, and there's much greater opportunity for economic development."

The middle-mile infrastructure will consist of high-capacity fiber lines that internet providers can use to carry high-speed internet service to end users. The project's first phases will begin sometime within the upcoming fiscal year that starts on July 1, the county said, and will involve implementing compliance guidelines from the National Environmental Policy Act that requires certain environmental protections for federal projects.

It will take "significant amounts of construction" to build the underground fiber lines in the coming years, Pima County Information Technology Director Javier Baca said, and the project will include "anchor locations" for internet providers to connect.



That means internet providers won't have to lay the fiber infrastructure themselves to reach low-density areas that yield a minimal return on investment. Instead, the fiber will already be available for providers to connect rural residents to the internet.

"This ring doesn't provide internet service in itself, it provides access to those internet service providers in a much more affordable way for those internet service providers to get into the market," Baca said.

Nearly 10% of households in Pima County lack broadband internet access, according to data from the Federal Communications Commission. Some communities the new fiber line will reach showed up to 18% of households had no internet access, the county said.

Rex Scott, the Pima County Supervisor presiding over District 1, said he often hears concerns from constituents about the lack of internet access in Catalina and other areas in the foothills. Those concerns heightened as many students shifted to online, remote learning models throughout the pandemic, creating barriers for those without internet access.

"When it comes to education, we shouldn't have a system of haves and have-nots, and that's the part of this grant that has me the most excited, because it will give struggling families and their children access to schools that a lot of us take for granted," Scott said.

The new project adds to the ongoing <u>Connect Pima</u> program that aims to build broadband infrastructure and increase internet access throughout the county while promoting digital literacy among residents. The county's been partnering with the city of Tucson to expand internet access throughout the region and is currently working on making sure the city's fiber network connects with the county's to avoid "two disparate networks," said Chris Mazzarella, Tucson's chief information officer.

"This is a key piece of infrastructure, just like the roadways are," Mazzarella said. "When we look at these fiber capabilities, it doesn't just immediately fill the gap, and it doesn't just help with some of those underprivileged areas, but it also makes sure we're well positioned for the future for decades ahead."



Every year I see one or two in my yard, and have found them in my courtyard. When this happens I call our very brave Three Points Fire Department and they come, catch them and release them in the desert.


A few days ago, my sister saw me drive into our driveway and wanted to help me bring in the groceries. She had been out in the courtyard watering the plants not more than ten minutes before.

April Monthly Reminders Planting Planting

- Plant warm season annuals for summer flowering-aster, coneflower, gaillardia, lisianthus, marigold, pentas, portulaca, Madagascar periwinkle and zinnia.
- Plant perennials that provide color and attract pollinators chamomile, Gooding's verbena, justicia, lantana, Russian sage, and salvias.
- Sow seeds outdoors for cucumbers (English and Armenian), melons, okra, squash, yard-long beans. Transplant eggplant, peppers, tomatoes, and thyme.
- Plant heat-loving vines Baja passion vine, pink trumpet vine, yellow orchid vine, crossvine (For many others refer to Landscape Vines for Southern Arizona AZ 1606)
- Plant fig trees (Refer to Growing Common Figs in the Low Desert AZ 1636).
- Plant citrus trees to give them time to get established before cold weather.

Maintenance

• If plants have yellow leaves with green veins (iron chlorosis) correct with chelated iron.

Feel free to stop by and take a look!!

- Monitor for aphids and spider mites; use a blast of water to discourage them or add one tablespoon of liquid dish detergent to one gallon of water and spray the top and bottom of leaves.
- Flush accumulated salts from the root zones of drip-irrigated plants by watering three times as long as you would normally.
- Protect young plants from wildlife. The best way to keep critters out is to fence them with poultry or woven wire fencing. If rabbits are your problem, use half inch poultry wire. Cage individual plants or entire plantings. The wire fencing should be two to three feet high. Stake the fencing to keep it standing up. If you have problems with ground squirrels or chipmunks, you'll need to use fencing with smaller openings; one-quarter inch woven wire. Cap the top of the fence with woven wire as ground squirrels and chipmunks can climb. Keep the fencing up until plants become more mature and less appealing to wildlife.
- Thin fruit of deciduous trees such as apple, peach, plum and apricot. Pick marble-sized (or smaller) fruit off so that the fruit are spaced about 6 inches part.

Fertilizing

• Fertilize citrus (2nd of 3 annual feedings). For oranges, tangerines, and grapefruit, apply 1/3 of the total in January-February, 1/3 in March-April, and 1/3 in May-June. For lemons and limes, apply 1/3 of the total in January-February, 1/3 in March-April, and 1/3 in August-September. (Refer to Citrus Fertilization Chart AZ1671)

Watering

• Check and adjust irrigation frequencies for March-May as per Arizona Department of Water Resources Guide





few years ago this program stopped for lack of attendance.


This program took place at Serenity Baptist Church. Recently Patzi Hughes, church secretary, has received several questions about the availability of a local AA Meeting.



The Three Points Fire District wants to make sure everyone is aware that snakes are starting to move around. We have had several calls for removal.




If you encounter a reptile, and you want it removed please call 911. This is also the time of year people like to cleanup, so be careful moving objects that snakes can hide under.

Activities For A Preschooler

Ball Theme Alphabet Activity: Kick the Cup

This ball theme alphabet activity is fun way to practice identifying letter sounds while kicking a ball. Kids will love the chance to move and learn!

Educational Benefits:

While playing the Kick the Cup Alphabet Activity children will:

- •identify letters by name
- •identify letter sounds
- develop gross motor skills like balance and coordination while kicking the ball

This activity is very easy to set up and do with your child. You only need a few simple materials that

are easy to pick up at the store.

Materials Needed: Small ball, Plastic cups, Permanent Marker

Setting Up the Kick the Cup Alphabet Activity

1. Write a letter on each plastic cup with permanent marker. I actually wrote the lowercase letter on one side of the cup and the uppercase match on the other side. This way you can turn them around to work on both versions of each letter.

2. Line the cups up in a row on the floor.

Playing this Ball Theme Alphabet Activity

Your child stands facing the cups with the ball in front of him.

When instructed to kick, they will kick the ball towards the cups and usually knocked one or two of them over.

Have them go over to the cups that were knocked over and identified the letter on each cup and the sound each letter makes

ABC Car Parking Lot

This ABC car parking lot is the perfect letter recognition activity. What could be more fun that driving toy cars around and then parking them in the parking lot?

Create your lot with permanent marker and ruler. You could use the cardboard from a shipping box, a poster board, or cardstock paper for your parking lot. To begin make a small parking lot.

Use magnetic letter instead of writing the letters in the parking lot. Young children learn letters more quickly when they can touch and feel the shape of the letters. Touching and feeling the shape of letters helps children

retain information in their long term memory.

If you have some little learners who need extra practice matching uppercase letters, then use the uppercase magnetic letters in your parking lot

Trico Electric Cooperative Selected to Proceed Forward with Powering Affordable Clean Energy (PACE) Award of \$83.5M from the United States Department of Agriculture (USDA)

Trico was one of five cooperatives across the country selected by the USDA to move forward in the award process for the <u>Powering Affordable Clean Energy (PACE) program</u>. Trico's application includes four renewable energy and battery energy storage projects designed to provide cost-effective and sustainable energy solutions for its Members in Southern Arizona. Trico's projects include the following:

Arivaca Rural Microgrid: A microgrid with 3MW of solar generation and 3MW/12MWh of battery storage capacity, designed to serve the load of approximately 620 residents in Arivaca. A microgrid is a power system that can be detached from the main electric grid either full time or for a specific event, like a power outage. This project is designed to use renewable energy and battery technology to improve reliability and resilience, especially during extreme weather events like monsoons.

Trico Standalone Battery Energy Storage System: This 10MW/40MWh battery storage system will help Trico manage its peaks and save Members money by charging the battery when solar energy is plentiful and prices are low and discharging energy during peaks when market prices are high. The project will be located on the northwest side of Trico's service territory where rapid growth is increasing demand

Avion Solar and Battery Energy Storage Facility II: A facility with 10MW of solar generation and 10MW/40MWh of battery storage capacity, designed to provide cost-effective and sustainable renewable energy for Trico Members. The project will be located near Trico's existing Avion Solar and Battery Energy Storage Facility in Marana, Arizona, and will be capable of powering about 2,500 homes.

Valencia Solar and Battery Energy Storage Facility: A facility with 10MW of solar generation and 10MW/40MWh of battery storage capacity, designed to provide cost-effective and sustainable renewable energy for Trico Members, including the Pascua Yaqui Nation. The project will be located near Trico's Valencia Substation and will be capable of powering about 2,500 homes.

Trico expects to develop and build the PACE projects over the next five years working with regional partners and the community to locate the projects and maximize their effectiveness. Development work will start immediately.

"PACE is a big win for Trico Members and Southern Arizona and we are excited to be working with USDA and RUS," said Brian Heithoff, Trico CEO & General Manager. "The projects Trico is planning to build will provide cost-effective, sustainable energy solutions and benefit our Members for decades to come."

Trico Electric Cooperative to Receive \$7M Grant for Clean Rural Microgrid Project in Arivaca

Trico is one of seven cooperatives across the country participating in a National Rural Electric Cooperative Association (NRECA) consortium that was selected to receive \$45 million in funding from the Department of Energy to build solar and battery microgrids in rural communities. The benefit is expected to be around \$7M to Trico Members, which Trico will use to build a solar generation and battery energy storage microgrid system in rural Southern Arizona.

April

Average high: 80.5F (26.9C) Average low: 50.1F (10.1C) Relative humidity at 5 am: 42% Relative humidity at 5 pm: 16% Normal rainfall: .31 (7.9mm)

Dryness begins to settle on the desert, with just a few days of possible sprinkles. Spring weather arrives in the mountains, with days in the 60s (>15C) and only half the nights dropping below freezing.

Flora

The desert bean trees (legumes such as blue palo verdes, catclaw acacias, and mesquites) begin to open yellow to creamy blooms, and the cacti begin to bloom as well, with a few of the prickly pears, chollas, and hedgehogs starting off. By the end of the month, some saguaro cacti will open their big, white flowers. Brittlebush may still bloom; look for ironcross blister beetlesthey are black, yellow and red with black cross patterns on their backsfeeding on the brittlebush blossoms.

Fauna

Bird migration continues. Summers hawks, including Swainsons, zone-tailed and Black hawks, begin to arrive and get busy finding mates for the summer breeding season. In mountain canyons around Tucson many hummingbirds arrive and breed, including broad-billed, black-chinned and magnificent. White-winged doves also return and fill the late-spring air with the signature summer call, Who-cooks-for-you? As the days lengthen and warm up, reptiles become more visibletime to watch for rattlesnakes (although remember they can be out any month of the year). Desert iguanas, lesser earless lizards and western whiptail lizards begin breeding. Bobcats, coyotes and foxes are having litters. And butterfly activity picks up; look for great blue hairstreak, hackberry, skipper, blue, and queen butterflies.

Nature Watching Tips for April

A walk up Romero Canyon Trail in Catalina State Park may yield some late-spring wildflowers and good butterfly activity in late morning and throughout warm afternoons. Before the trail climbs the western slopes of the Santa Catalina Mountains, it crosses through a mature mesquite bosque (Spanish for forest) where you can look for songbirds, hummingbirds, and white-winged doves. For information on the park, call (520) 628-5798. April is also a good time for people in the Phoenix area to look for warblers, flycatchers and Bullocks orioles in the Forest Service picnic areas on Bush Highway along the Salt River.

Dear Robles Elementary School Families,

As we usher in the month of April, I wanted to reach out to you with some important information regarding the upcoming Arizona's AASA testing for students in grades 3rd to 5th. These assessments are crucial in providing insight

into your child's academic progress and help us tailor our teaching methods to better support their growth. Not only is it meaningful for your students but the results of these assessments determine the letter grades that are assigned to schools.

The AASA testing will be conducted throughout the month of April, and it is essential that your child is adequately prepared. To ensure success, here are some suggestions on what parents can do at home to help their children on test day:

Establish a Consistent Routine: Encourage your child to establish a consistent study routine at home. A good night's sleep is crucial for optimal cognitive function and concentration during the exams. Then, get up early, so they do not have to rush in the morning to get to school, as this sets a tone for their day.

Encourage Healthy Habits: It is important that they are eating their breakfast, lunch, and dinner; they need that fuel for their brains. Here at school we will provide them with breakfast and lunch.

Stay Positive and Encouraging: Offer words of encouragement and support to your child throughout their preparation. Remind them that their best effort is what truly matters, and reassure them that you believe in their abilities.

Additionally, I want to remind you about the Arizona Move On When Reading Requirement. This initiative aims to ensure that all students are proficient in reading by the end of third grade. If your child is currently in third grade, they will complete the AASA Reading Fluency Assessment, in April. We will be notified of their results in early May, and will reach out if your child did not meet the requirement.

If you have any questions or concerns regarding the AASA testing or the Move On When Reading Requirement, please don't hesitate to reach out to your child's teacher or our school administration. Your partnership is invaluable in supporting your child's academic journey.

Fourth Grade

In fourth grade, our focus for English Language Arts has shifted from learning *how* to read into reading comprehension skills. Our students have taken on the challenge this year, learning to analyze point of view, identify main ideas, and understand text and graphic features in an informational text, among many other important skills. Students have also been learning how to write more complex sentences with colorful language and how to plan a paragraph. They are putting all of the reading and writing skills they've learned to the test through reading comprehension and writing.

In math, students have learned a wide variety of topics. This year, we learned about measurements, area, and perimeter. We also worked with multi-digit mathematical operations, including addition, subtraction, and multiplication. Students were introduced to long division, and then came back to geometry, where we learned to measure angles, identify lines, and classify triangles. We are deep into fractions, learning about finding equivalents, comparing the size of fractions, and performing mathematical operations with them.

In addition to Math and ELA, we are learning about lots of exciting topics in Science and Social Studies. For Science, we have learned about animal adaptations, energy and magnets, Earth's systems, natural disasters, the water cycle, and more. In Social Studies, we have learned about American history starting in prehistoric times. Students learned theories of how the earliest people reached the Americas, studied Native tribes, and learned about the Age of Exploration. We will finish the year out with the colonies, and leave the students prepared to learn about the American Revolutionary War and the founding of the United States in 5th grade.

This school year has flown by, and we are having a great time in fourth grade! We are excited to continue learning new skills and topics, and reviewing those that students have already learned as we near the end of our school year.




Storytime & Craft
