#### The HUB - Robles Ranch Food Bank

The Robles Ranch Food Bank is proud to announce we are now serving our Three Points clients from our new, improved, and much more spacious location. While the address of the new food bank is the same as the old (16150 W Ajo Hwy), locals will have noticed the large new building located to the front of this lot. The food bank has a generous portion of this new building, 12' x 48', as opposed to our previous 10' x 20', and we are excited to celebrate our new digs!

In addition to our new location, we were able to secure grant funding to obtain two additional refrigerator / freezer units and shelving. The new location also has a reception area so that clients can come in out of the elements while their food boxes are being loaded for delivery to their vehicles.

Clients of the food bank can visit once a month. In the 2024 calendar the Robles Ranch Food Bank distributed an average of 218 boxes each month to 178 households, which benefitted approximately 389 individuals.

We are fortunate to have supportive neighbors here in Three Points that regularly bring donations to us. One neighbor comes at least twice a month with a donation of boxed macaroni and cheese, oatmeal packets, hot chocolate mixes, etc. Another brings us several flats of canned vegetables each month. You know who you are and the Robles Ranch Food Bank says THANK YOU! If you have interest in making donations, items can be brought down during any of our normal

### U of A Cooperative Extension Monthly Garden Reminders for February

February is an active gardening month for gardeners. Days get a bit warmer but be prepared for occasional cold snaps as some of our coldest nights have occurred in February. There are still many cool season vegetables to plant this month, and you can prepare for your warm season veggie garden or plant perennials for summer color. This is a great time to be in the desert!

#### **Maintenance**

- Prune any dormant deciduous trees and shrubs you missed in January. Although no pruning is necessary for citrus trees, dead and diseased wood as well as crisscrossing limbs should be removed if the danger of frost has passed.
- Watch for cold temperatures both night and day and protect plants as needed.
- Leave frost damage on plants until the danger of freezing has completely passed. Pruning too early means that vulnerable plants are exposed unnecessarily; new growth may appear which is even more frost sensitive.
- Check your irrigation system for leaks due to freezing temperatures and repair them.
- If you did not prune established roses earlier, do so early in the month. Discard all potentially diseased, dropped leaves and cuttings do not leave them under the plants or compost them. Healthy leaves are OK to compost.
- Cut back native grasses such as muhlenbergia species (Muhly grass) to about 4-6 inches high before new growth starts. Cutting to this height allows you to clean out dead and brown blades of grass and allows for new green growth. Native grasses have the added benefit of not needing to amend the soil or use fertilizer.
- Plan and prepare your summer garden layout and rotate the location of certain vegetables if needed. It's a good idea to keep a garden journal to keep track of these details.
- Successful vegetable and annual flower gardens require amending the soil each planting cycle. The goal is to have loose, fertile, well-drained soil for these specialty gardens.
  - Prepare garden soils for spring planting of vegetables and annual flowers. Improving soil structure creates favorable conditions for seed germination and root growth.
  - O The recommended amendments include compost, composted manure, and worm castings. These add essential nutrients and are teeming with biological life that helps to build good soil. Adding amendments such as perlite and vermiculite increase aeration and drainage.
  - Do not add wood ash, crushed eggshells or gypsum to the soil. Wood ash raises soil alkalinity, crushed eggshells are unnecessary, and gypsum is not recommended for our gardening conditions.
  - Winter rains bring weeds, so begin scouting for and manually removing weeds as soon as you notice them.
  - Look for aphids they like cooler temps and new growth. They may appear on other plants besides roses.
- Now is a good time to consider planning or installing active or passive rainwater harvesting.

#### **Planting**

 Harvest cabbage and cauliflower. Monitor lettuce for signs of bolting. If they do bolt, consider letting them set seeds that you

- can save for next year or donate to the Pima County Seed Library.
- Sow annual seeds outdoors or plant starts for black-eyed Susan, fleabane, gaillardia, gloriosa daisy, Mexican sunflower, nasturtium, primrose and sunflower.
- Plant perennials such as autumn sage, butterfly weed, chuparosa, damianita, desert mallow, desert milkweed, lavender, moss verbena, and pineleaf milkweed.
- Plant bare-root roses near the end of the month.
- Continue to harvest most varieties of oranges and citrus.

#### **Fertilizing**

- Continue with mild fertilizing of winter vegetables.
- Fertilize citrus (1st of 3 annual feedings). For oranges, tangerines, and grapefruit, apply 1/3 of the total in January-February, 1/3 in March-April, and 1/3 in May-June. For lemons and limes, the first two applications are the same, but the last 1/3 isn't until August-September.
- Over-seeded Bermuda grass lawns need applications of a nitrogen fertilizer once per month.
- Other uses of fertilizer are not advised. Fertilizers stimulate new growth that will be frost-sensitive.

#### Watering

- February rainfall is normally about an inch. If your yard receives significant rain, adjust the amount of water you are supplying your plants. Change only the frequency not the duration.
- Test your irrigation system for leaks and problems.
- No irrigation for cacti, agave, yucca and desert trees and shrubs through the end of the month.

#### **Winter Heating Tips for Arizona Homes**

- Check all vents on your HVAC system to ensure they are unobstructed and free of any debris. You can also vacuum out individual vents to ensure any small objects are removed.
- Change HVAC filters before winter to keep your system working efficiently and avoid an unnecessary rise in heating costs over the winter.
- Consider having a professional maintenance check before winter to ensure there are no missed problems.

#### Clean and Check Your Fireplace

In addition to thoroughly reviewing your HVAC system to ensure it is working properly, it is very important to check and clean your fireplace before winter (if you have one). A thorough check of a fireplace includes a number of essential steps:

- Cleaning the chimney each season is vital, as the excessive buildup of creosote inside it can be a major safety hazard and start fires. Some homeowners are equipped to clean their chimneys, but hiring a professional to ensure the job is done right is best.
- Creosote is not the only concern for chimneys. When cleaning, you will want to thoroughly check in and around the chimney for debris twigs, birds' nests, or other items that may have blocked or damaged the chimney.
- Check the outside of the fireplace and chimney for any noticeable cracks or other changes. These damages can sometimes occur with high heat and, ideally, should be repaired before the heating season begins.
- Double-check that all of your smoke detectors and fire extinguishers are working. It is doubly helpful to have a smoke detector near the fireplace to catch any dangerous situations quickly.
- Depending on the design of your fireplace, you will likely want to clear ash from the fireplace or catchment area before the season begins.

Following these tips can help maximize energy efficiency and keep your home safe when you're cozying up by a roaring fire!

#### **Quick Winter Energy Tips**

In addition to the broad systems reviews outlined above, a number of smaller tips can be highly effective in promoting energy efficiency in cold weather.

#### Set Thermostat's Fan Setting to "AUTO" — Not "ON"

By putting your fan on AUTO, it will be able to effectively modulate itself through the colder weather — avoiding blowing cool air through your vents and wasting energy and electricity.

#### Run Ceiling Fans in Reverse To Turn Down Thermostat

Running ceiling fans normally in the warmer month helps to cool your home. In the winter, try the opposite. By running your ceiling fans in reverse, you can re-circulate warm air throughout the room. This may even allow you to lower the temperature on your thermostat and save money.

#### Use a Programmable Thermostat

You can save a whole lot of money — and promote energy efficiency — by using a programmable thermostat.

#### **Seal Air Duct Leaks**

Take a look around your home for air ducts, pipes, vents, or wires coming into your home or into specific rooms.

#### Do A Basic Furnace Inspection

If your home has a traditional furnace, it is essential to do an inspection each heating season. While service from a professional is vital, doing a quick check on your own can alert you to any immediate problems.

- Check for rust or water leakage around your furnace —
  particularly around the base. Any sign of structural damage
  indicates that you should have service performed
  immediately.
- Check around the furnace for anything flammable. These can be a major safety hazard and should be removed immediately. Even basic "clutter" around the furnace could be a hazard, so be sure to clear some space around it and generally clean around it as well.
- Change the furnace filter, if necessary.
- Schedule a maintenance inspection. Furnaces are complicated machines and are best double-checked by a professional.

#### **Professional Maintenance Checks**

In general, professional maintenance checks are essential at the start of the heating season. Even in a warmer climate like Phoenix's, a maintenance check can ensure your system works efficiently and exposes any systemic vulnerabilities you may have missed. While the tips above are a great way to get started, there is simply no substitute for a professional check.

#### VFW Post 10254 Has Two Essay Winners

The VFW is dedicated to promoting patriotism and investing in our future generation. If you are a democracy-loving high school student interested in a \$35,000 college scholarship or a patriotic middle school student interested in winning \$5,000, these scholarships may be for you.



Hailey Norris won the VFW Post 10254 Patriot's Pen contest. Patriot's Pen Each year is participated in by nearly 68,800 students in sixth through eighth grades to the VFW's youth essay contest for a chance to win their share of nearly \$1 million in state and national awards. Each first place state winner receives a minimum of \$500 at the national level, and the national first place winner wins \$5,000!

The essay contest encourages young minds to examine America's history, along with their own experiences in modern American society, by drafting a 300- to 400-word essay, expressing their views based on a patriotic theme chosen by the VFW Commander-in-Chief.

Aliyah Moloch won VFW Post 10254 Voice of Democracy which was Established in 1947 and is an audio-essay program which provides high school students with the unique opportunity to express themselves in regards to a democratic and patriotic-themed recorded

essay. Each year, nearly 40,000 9-12 grade students from across the country enter to win their share of \$2.1 million in educational scholarships and incentives awarded through the program.

The national first-place winner receives a \$30,000 scholarship paid directly to the recipient's American university, college or vocational/technical school. A complete list of other national scholarships range from \$1,000-\$15,000, and the first-place winner from each VFW Department (state) wins a minimum scholarship of \$1,000 and an all-expense-paid trip to Washington, D.C.




