Residents of Three Points who currently have their water provided by Tucson Water, recently received a letter about the upcoming change.

GWR scheduled a meeting at the Community Center on May 14th to meet the residents and answer questions. The representatives from GWR talked about the other wells they already manage here and that aquiring the Tucson Water wells is a good fit for them. The transference of the wells is a highly regulated process and has been months in the planning and there is still a way to go until the transfer is complete. This summer the plan will be reviewed by Arizona Corporation Commission and the projected transfer date is December 31, 2024

They also stated that what residents are currently paying for their water will remain the same for two years.



Here is Shayla's story:


My name is Shayla Ramon, and I'm the youngest of five kids. I am Native American from the Tohono O'odham Nation and a sixth-generation cattle owner. I work with my eighty-one year old grandfather, fifty-five year old disabled father and nineteen year old brother during the weekends and every break I get from school for herding cattle and fixing fences on our property.

I would be the first person to go to a four-year university on both my mother's and father's side and to get a college education with the exception of my mother who has an associate degree from Pima Community College and father who also got an associate degree from Pima Community College as well. Attending a fouryear university is a greater expense than attending a community college which could be a burden to my family financially. With this scholarship money, I would be able to explore where I want to go and what career I want to do in the meantime.

> An Update On Last Year's Scholarship Winner

I am Christian Cortes a recipient of the scholarship last year. Since I received that scholarship and now, my life has completely changed.

When I originally submitted my scholarship application, I planned to do welding at Pima Community College. However, one day I received a scholarship to play baseball at Ottawa University -Arizona. Baseball has always been a passion to me and I just wasn't ready to give it up just yet. During the summer, I had gotten appendicitis. And on June 30th, I had it removed. At that moment, I had still planned to go to Pima. But in early August, I got the offer to continue one of my long life dreams of playing baseball.

With a college degree and with this money, I can pay for myself and not depend on other people as well as experience things myself, living in another city without mom or dad around just for myself but also knowing what it's like to be on my own



for the first time in my life and not knowing what is in store for me in the next few months or even years.

I plan on going to Arizona State University and to live in a dorm on the West campus which is located in Glendale, AZ also known as Metro Phoenix. This scholarship is going to help me with some of the cost of living in Phoenix, AZ.

The Marion Whitfield Volunteer Scholarship will further my goals by helping me with any college debts, fines, school supplies, and housing for my years at college, although I'm not sure what to major or study at this moment, I know ! want a college degree under my name.

Now at Ottawa University, I still get to play baseball and I am studying to be a physical therapist. The reason for this change is that since my surgery, I have realized that the profession is really overlooked. People don't realize the care that goes behind it. I am really grateful to Ottawa University and the opportunity they gave me.

This year I had a great season. At Ottawa, there's two teams. The main team and the development team. Although I was on the developmental I had a lot of fun. A good part of being on the developmental team is that it doesn't waste a year of my eligibility. We played about 40 games and although I didn't start, and over time I got the starting job.

Pima County Flood Control District

With the summer monsoon approaching, the Pima County Regional Flood Control District would like to encourage all property owners and renters within Pima County to purchase or update their flood insurance if they are located within a designated



floodplain or area prone to flooding.

The Federal Emergency Management Agency's Community Rating System upgraded Pima County in April to a Class-2 Community, which puts the County in the top 0.5 percent of communities nationwide and qualifies residents for a 40 percent discount on flood insurance premiums. In addition to the discounted premiums, residents can also opt for partial coverage since most flood damage in Pima County is not catastrophic.

Contrary to popular belief, damage from flooding is not covered under homeowners' or renters' insurance. A separate policy must be obtained to protect a home and its contents and it may be available at an affordable rate due to the County's Class-2 CRS classification.

Home owners and renters can go to the District's flood insurance web page (<u>www.pima.gov/1519/Flood-Insurance</u>) to determine if their property is in a floodplain and qualifies for flood insurance protection. For more information about federal

Who Knew Gila Monsters Could Climb

I have lived out here for close to 20 years. I have seen several Gila Monsters roaming around the yard over the years. They kept their distance and I kept mine.

A couple of weeks ago my sister went out to water her plants in our enclosed courtyard and she was surprised to find a Gila Monster. It hissed at her. As she watched it, it walked thru my roses then calmly walked straight up the courtyard wall and sat on top to look at her. In March we had a rattlesnake invade our courtyard, so we are hyper vigilant now when we let out our little dogs.

The Gila monster is one of only three species of venomous lizards on the planet. They are non-threatening creatures who spend 95 percent of their lives in underground burrows. They come out occasionally to feed or soak in the warm desert sun.

These animals do not want to bite you. In fact, before biting, these desert creatures will often hiss or even back away slightly. This is their warning that they are not happy and are going into defense mode. If a Gila monster still feels threatened after this warning, then it can bite in a split second.

The bite is usually forceful and inflicts injury and serious pain. Once the Gila latches on, it chews on the site, releasing venom along the grooves in its teeth into the now open wound. It generally does not release its painful hold until it feels that it is no longer in danger.

If you find yourself on the unfortunate end of one of these situations, please seek medical attention in the nearest emergency room. Although the bite is rarely life-threatening, symptoms from a Gila monster bite may include swelling, intense burning pain,





vomiting, dizziness, weakness, rapid heart rate, and/or low blood pressure.

Preventing a bite is usually possible. If you see a Gila monster, leave it alone and keep small children and pets away from it. If the Gila monster doesn't relocate after a day, rural fire departments will usually come to assist.

The Arizona Poison and Drug Information Center offers the following advice if you are bitten by a Gila monster:


• Remain calm.

• If you are bitten on the arm or hand, try to get the lizard's feet on the ground by lowering it down. It may feel safer that way and let go.

• Pry the jaws open using a strong stick or other device. But, be sure to allow the lizard a strong foothold on the ground while you are prying it off, or you will only increase its agitation.

- Immobilize your bitten limb below your heart level.
- Get to a medical facility immediately.
- Do not apply ice, a constriction bandage or a tourniquet.
- Bitten pets should be taken to a veterinarian immediately.

Call the toll-free national hotline at 1-800-222-1222 to reach your local poison center. If you live in Arizona outside of Maricopa County, this number will get you to our experts at the Arizona Poison and Drug Information Center in Tucson.

Hot and dry ... a challenge for our gardens.

Tip of the Month

The average landscape is home to thousands of insects that are the base of many food webs, supporting birds, mammals and other creatures. Only one-tenth of this population is destructive the majority are beneficial ones that work tirelessly to control many common garden insect pests. To attract beneficial insect species to your garden, include different types of native plants and avoid pesticides.

Beneficial insects fall into three main categories: pollinators, predators and parasitizers. *Pollinators* are critical to our food supply. These include bees, butterflies, flies and moths. *Predators* include ladybugs, praying mantises, green lacewings, assassin bugs, robber flies, hoverflies, ground beetles and soldier beetles. Overall, they are the best pest control, eating pests like aphids, stink bugs and Japanese beetles. *Parasitizers* include parasitic wasps that lay their eggs on host insects. Insect larvae also are voracious predators, killing aphids, caterpillars, beetles and thrips.

Planting

Sow seeds of cantaloupe, corn, green beans, summer squash, native melons, Armenian cucumber and okra.

Plant warm-season color annuals such as cosmos, hollyhock, marigold, salvia, sunflower, zinnia, gaillardia, gomphrena, coreopsis, vinca and gazania.

Watering

Water turf efficiently by soaking 8-10 inches deep to moisten the Bermuda grass root zone.

Bedding plants will need water more often this month.

Transplanting

Transplant herbs such as basil, marjoram, oregano, rosemary and thyme.

Plant desert-adapted plants this month. The roots readily expand in the heated soil.

Harvesting

The first fig crop starts ripening this month. Fruit matures only on the tree, so keep birds away by covering with netting.

Fertilizing

Feed cacti and succulents during the warm months. Apply a fertilizer formulated specifically for cacti and succulents every month.Apply fertilizer twice monthly to vegetables. Do not add to dry soil. Cut back on fertilizing roses to encourage plants to slow down for the summer.

<u>Preparing</u>

Apply pre-emergent to avoid weeds when the monsoons arrive.

Pruning

Prune back mature bougainvillea, lantana and hibiscus to stimulate blooms. Cut back spring bloomers such as brittle bush, penstemon and salvia. Prune young trees early in the summer to slow growth and correct structure.

Protecting

Cover vegetables with 50-70 percent shade cloth to reduce temperatures, prevent sunscald and increase blossom set for better fruit production.

Cover citrus trunks to prevent sunburn damage.

Drape plants with netting or shade cloth to protect from birds

It's important to keep in mind that the hotter temperatures and outdoor summer activities we love can present safety concerns.

We've gathered some tips to help ensure that these activities are a bit safer for you and your family.

- 1. Check all of your interior safety devices. Test smoke and carbon monoxide detectors and replace batteries if needed. You should upgrade any device that is over 10 years old just to be safe. Also, make sure that you have a working fire extinguisher in your kitchen.
- 2. Remove weeds, leaves and other fallen debris from your yard. In extreme heat, these items can be become a fire hazard.
- **3. Cover your swimming pool when not in use.** Install or secure safety fences that are at least 4 feet tall if you have little ones. For added security, consider installing a pool alarm to alert you when someone enters the pool.
- 4. Water your lawns early in the morning. This is the best time because the air is cool. Do not water during the heat of the day, as the water will simply evaporate. Watering in the evening is not wise either as water can sit, which promotes fungus growth.






Second Quarter:


